FOOD GLORIOUS FOOD? was our topic and we approached this topic with the following general agenda:

1. * The little known facts about food as a polluter. The following was a great source for charts and information:

http://www.scientificamerican.com/article/how-wasted-food-turns-into-huge-amounts-of-greenhouse-gas/

- * 1/3 human-generated green house gas emissions come from the global food system
- * 1/3 of food lost during harvest, storage and transport = 9.3 Billion metric tons of CO2 (half of total emissions 2017)
- Charts showing the food loss and waste by country and Greenhouse Gas Emissions by Food Type as well as the impact of each step of the food chain
- 2. Where we get our food, the amounts and what we purchase, and how we store it.

Buy Local – Farmers Markets, grocery stores

Delivery Services that either sell imperfect or food that would normally not be sold, may be broken, or blemished but still viable.

- Misfit Market/Imperfect Foods (\$60 Minimum free shipping accepts returns of bubble wrap from eggs, ice packs and foil padded bags from refrig/frozen foods
- Seafood/ Meat delivery services

Delivery Services that offer food from local farms, bakeries etc.

- Harvie.farm

We didn't really discuss how to cut down on what we purchase and consume but acknowledged that those amounts have an impact. Using leftovers may seem old fashioned but helps cut down on waste. There are online sites for how to use certain leftovers.

Great source for planning how much you buy as well as how to plan when entertaining:

SAVETHEFOOD.COM - this site's planners are great and GUESTIMATER for ententertaining.

Buy and eat more veggies, BUY organic, read labels for sources e.g. sources of seafood and how processed:

STORAGE options – the group discussed the ways everyone repurposes plastic containers, bins, bread bags, soup mix plastic bags, take out containers etc. – to use at least one time more before discarding.

Options- Waxed fabric (not too popular with group)
Silicone bowl lids • locking casserole dishes with lids
"Tupperware/Rubbermaid" • compostable "zip locks"
Silicone "zip locks" •

3. How we dispose of our excess food and food waste.

NOTE: As of September 30 – 23% of students at Quaker Valley School District qualify for free or reduced lunch – based on the family self-reporting; many families are embarrassed to report so the percentage does not reflect the true need.

- a. Share with a neighbor/friend, take to work
- b. Donate to the food bank Sewickley Community Center Food Pantry donations are taken the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of each month from 11 Am-1:30 PM. Martha provided a list of suggested donations which included non-perishable items.

Regarding composting - I invited three people to speak about their personal experience and process for composting. Only 2 were able to attend.

Margie Gilfillan (from Grapevine Garden Club) talked about how she uses the Zero Waste Wrangler drop off at Sweetwater Center for the Arts and all the items you can drop off there (including pizza boxes/soiled) – there is an annual fee.

zerowastewrangler.com: This company also provides curbside pickup to residents of Edgeworth and Sewickley along the Rt. 65 corridor.

Cindy Kaye spoke about her home composting techniques, processes and her progress along the journey. She brought some of the containers she uses for composting, including the bucket with dehydrated compost from her electric composting machine and a book she finds to be the best for the beginner:

ORGANIC BOOK OF COMPOSTING by Pauline Pear

Cindy also explained how she mixes the dehydrated compost with her regular compost and soil for her garden.
